Experience in psychiatry:

After qualifying in medicine at Guys Hospital Medical School, University of London, Dr Sireling trained in psychiatry. He has practised in this field for over forty years and has been a consultant in adult psychiatry since 1987. From 1989 to 2015 he engaged in part-time private practice as a general adult psychiatrist, holding admission privileges at three private hospitals.

His NHS post from 1987 until 2006 carried clinical responsibility for the psychiatric needs of a suburban area with pockets of high deprivation, including consultant responsibility for inpatients and leadership of a multi-disciplinary team in the community. From 2006 to 2009 he provided medical leadership to a new service in Primary Care Mental Health, within the same trust (Barnet Enfield and Haringey Mental Health NHS Trust). Between 2001 and 2011 he was also the consultant to the Barnet Early Intervention in Psychosis Service, which he co-founded.

In 1997 he was appointed as District Lead Clinician for Suicide Audit, and in 2003 as Trust Lead Clinician for Suicide Audit, subsequently redesignated as Lead Clinician for Suicide Prevention and Audit. After taking early retirement from his NHS post in 2009 he worked part-time until 2011 in the Early Intervention Services in Barnet and Enfield, with one session in trust-wide suicide prevention. He held an honorary consultant appointment in suicide prevention from 2011 to 2012.

Until 2010 he was Regional Representative for the General Adult Psychiatry Faculty of the Royal College of Psychiatrists; he represented the General Psychiatry Faculty on the Executive Committee of the London Division of the College and he has been an Examiner for the Royal College of Psychiatrists. Until retirement from private practice in 2015 he held the posts of GMC appointed medical examiner, and College Assessor for Advisory Appointments Committees.

He has researched, lectured and published in his areas of special interest which include suicide prevention and suicide audit, mood disorders and bereavement.

Recent clinical experience:

In 2010 he was appointed by the Lord Chancellor as a Specialist Medical Member of the First-tier Tribunal (Mental Health) and continues with this work. The Mental Health jurisdiction deals with the fundamental right to liberty and private life of the citizen in every case it hears. Applicants to the Tribunal range from those who are detained under the civil sections of the Mental Health Act to get treatment for their illness to those who have been convicted of offences and are mentally ill. The applicants range from children to older adults. The responsibilities of the Tribunal Medical Member include interviewing detained psychiatric inpatients on the ward in which they are detained, interviewing community patients subject to Community Treatment Orders prior to their hearing, and scrutinising the case records. This preliminary interview is mandatory in some cases and optional in others. The interviews and hearings are conducted in the hospital where the patient is detained.

In 2018 after holding a weekly outpatient clinic for a year in Jerusalem, he was awarded a full medical specialist license to practice psychiatry in Israel.

Medico-legal experience:

Dr Sireling has acquired extensive experience as an expert witness over more than 20 years, mainly in civil litigation, and particularly in alleged clinical negligence. The large majority of instructions have been from claimants. Approximately 20 expert witness reports are prepared per year.

He has examined and reported on many cases of adults following alleged abuse as children, mainly in the Irish Industrial School system. He has acted as External Adviser to convenors regarding complaints in the NHS and as independent Expert Witness appointed by HM Coroner.

Remote-work experience:

Dr Sireling has been working virtually since 2011: conducting Skype clinics between 2011 and 2015 and working with electronic bundles from instructing lawyers. Dr Sireling has been sitting on tribunals on the CVP (Cloud Video Platform) since April 2020. He has had extensive experience of virtual meetings and teleconferences.
